Research, Teaching and Service Interests

Research Interests

My research focuses on the politics of service delivery and public goods provision in developing countries. My interests engage an extensive and contradictory literature as to whether NGOs are promoting more representative, accountable governments. To investigate the impact of NGOs, I explore how interactions with NGOs shape citizens' attitudes toward government and their behavior in seeking support from government. In other work, I investigate interactions between governments and NGOs to understand the political and contextual factors that can lead to NGO-government collaboration and conflict. In addition to my research on actors in public goods provision, I further study service provision in sectors that are critical in addressing poverty, such as water, sanitation and energy. These services are easiest to provide in cities and in contexts of stability and a moderate level of development or wealth. Thus, I look at service provision in contexts where progress lags: rural areas, where there are few economies of scale and often weak political incentives for ongoing services; informal peri-urban communities where formal incorporation into city zoning is politically contentious; and conflict-affected areas where both governments and markets are weakened by threats to stability.

Teaching Interests

My own interest in political science and the core of my courses revolve around three intellectual interests: the development of institutions to increase representation and accountability, the challenge of increasing individual and community engagement to resolve social and political problems, and the identification of factors that stimulate human and economic development. I have developed five courses that all tie into different facets of these lines of inquiry: The Politics of Development, which engages competing theories about variation in human and economic development across countries, The Politics of Poverty and Inequality, which analyzes the causes and consequences of these issues at local levels, the Politics of Making a Difference, which assesses the factors that make individual and group efforts successful in social change, Comparative Political Economy of Development, a graduate course that reviews foundational scholarly work on economic development, and Water and Health in Latin America, which uses the problems of water, sanitation and health to analyze the politics of service delivery.

Service Interests

I hope to engage at UNM in activities that support internationalization of the university. To this end, I have served on three LAII committees and the International Studies Institute. I have also worked to organize a group of scholars to discuss collaboration on global health research at UNM. Further, I have given guest lectures for LAII, CNM, and the School of Public Administration on my research on global health and human development. I am also actively engaged in service both in the policy field of water, sanitation and hygiene, helping to organize panels and events, and in the profession of political science, serving as chair of the sub-field of comparative politics in developing countries for the Midwest Political Science Association.
